The Welcome

Jesus said, "Listen, I am standing at the door and knocking: if you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in and eat with you, and you with me"

We give thanks for this promise, for the company of each other and for God's presence with us.

God invites us here and so we greet each other,

(name) we welcome you to this table in the name of Christ Reply: Amen, it's good to be here.

We think about those who are not at this table today

We name people who we are particularly thinking about today

Whatever table they are at today, we pray that they will know the presence and blessing of God

Jesus said "When you have supper, do not invite just your friends, or relatives, or those who are wealthy... but rather invite the poor and those on the margins"

We confess to God the ways in which we have not been inclusive and welcoming in this past week - Pause

For safe journeying with the familiar and rejecting God in the stranger,

Lord, have mercy

For colluding with conflict and neglecting the way of peace, **Lord, have mercy**

For choosing to see the world, each other and ourselves with blinkered vision rather than the true sight of God, **Lord, have mercy.**

The promise of new beginnings

The prophet Isaiah writes: "On this mountain the Lord Almighty will prepare for all peoples a feast of rich food, a banquet of well-aged wines – the best of meats and the finest of wines. And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that covers all nations; he will swallow up death forever. Then the Lord will wipe away the tears from all faces, and he will take away the disgrace of his people from all the earth, for the Lord has spoken. In that day they will say,

This is our God; we trusted in him, and he saved us. This is the Lord for whom we waited, let us rejoice and be glad."

Bread is broken and wine is poured

God, the source of everything we are and everything we have, we offer you this bread, product of many grains, kneaded together as the body of new life.

We thank you, God, for everything good and whole in our lives.

God, who walked the way of the cross, betrayed and bereft, we offer you this wine, product of many grapes, crushed and fermented as the blood of new life.

We thank you, God, that when placed in your hands, all that is crushed in life holds the hope of healing and resurrection.

In the silence we think of things we would like to be changed in ourselves and in the world around us.

As we share this bread and wine we tell again the story of a God who is at the centre of all the goodness and suffering in this world.

We receive Christ who reveals the mystery and power of sacrificial love

While they were at the table Jesus took a loaf of bread and after giving thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying "Take; this is my body". Then he took a cup of wine, and gave it to them. "This is my blood – which is poured out for many."

Bread and wine are passed around.

Thank you God, for food and love

The first course is served

Thank you, Lord, for this meal but we cannot live by bread alone. We have shared it together because we need each other gathered round this table. We need (*name*)

Reply: And I need you

Lord God, as we bring our prayers
We thank you that we can share in
your Kingdom of justice and peace.
We come in our poverty, not in our wealth
in our blindness, not with great faith,
in our weakness, not in our strength.
You welcome all people
So now we bring to you those
from the wide and narrow streets of our world
who need the love of the God to whom we pray.
